Marion Avaline Looney Hawk (April 6, 1894 - March 18, 1994)
In August of 1862, the day after the Battle of Wilson's Creek. William Marion rode a horse up to the Battlefield. His daughter, Aveline Looney Hawk, said "my dad told me when they had the Battle of Wilson Creek, the word

Hawk Century Farm - A 40-acre tract of land, was awarded the designation of Missouri Century Farm by University of Missouri Extension on 1 January 1995. The property is located in the northern portion of Greene County, near the Greene-Polk County line. According to Land Patents records, by 1838, Isaac Looney had acquired 320 acres, in Township 31, Range 24, Section 12 (160) and Section 13 (160). And is still owned and worked by great-grandson Danny Hawk, and his family. This is the oldest Greene County Missouri Century Farm with original settler's descendants still living on and operating the farm. In addition to GCHSB recognition of the Looney Cemetery on the property, the Hawk Farm family are recipients of the first, "Jackie Warfel Most Valuable Farm Award", September 2018, by the Missouri Century Farm, Greene County MU Extension Council.

The land, known as the Hawk Farm, was established in 1833 by Isaac William Looney. Isaac William Looney, the fourth child of John and Mary (Polly) Garrison Looney, Sr. was born in Hawkins County, TN on 3 November 1802. In 1818, when he was about 16 years old, the family moved down to settle on the Cherokee Indian Tribal Lands, north of the Tennessee River in northeastern Alabama, Jackson County. It is here where records show, in July of 1819 a petition to the Secretary of War was signed by 237 men that had settled on the Indian lands. The petition was to extend the white settlers stay while completing their crops and harvest for fear of being driven where there would be no way to sustain themselves. They also argued they were living as good neighbors with the Cherokee. Among the 237 signers were the Garrisons and Looneys; including John Sr., and sons: Jesse, Isaac, Absalom, Benjamin, William, Sam and John, Jr.²

The fourth child of John Jr and Polly, Isaac, married Sarah Matthews about 1821 in Jackson County, Alabama. Their first three children were born there: Absolom, in 1822, Jane (Jennie) about 1824, and Benjamin, 1827. About 1828 the whole clan was on the move again...they moved to Illinois where some of the family remained, the area was in the section of Ralls County which became Monroe County, Missouri in 1831.³ Isaac's land was purchased 6 November 1828 in Range 10 West, Township 54, Section 24. This is where the fourth child, William Marion was born 31 October 1829.

The first Federal Census taken in the new state of Missouri was in 1830 and Isaac was listed as age 20-30, wife the same, a son and a daughter aged 5-10 and two sons under age 5. But soon, the Looney's kept moving west, finally taking out land in southwestern Missouri.

Two of Isaac's brothers sold their land in Monroe County in 1832 and moved to southwestern Missouri and Isaac followed them the next year (1833). They settled near what became the Greene-Polk County line. Isaac's land (when later entered) was located in the NE¼ of S13, T31, R24, a sparsely secluded area.

The Fulbrights, Campbells, Burnetts and Rountrees had settled in the Springfield area in 1830. The Delaware Indians had a town on the James River near Wilson's Creek and Kickapoos had a village where the southern part of the city of Springfield is located. These Indians were friendly, but the Osage Indians were hostile to these tribes and the new white settlers.

In 1833, Greene County was formed and took in the entire southwestern section in Missouri from the Gasconade River southward. The first tax assessor's list was made in 1833 and the Looney families were listed. Isaac Looney built his cabin on the top of a knoll where they could see all around for quite a distance. The cabin had no windows and descendants say these precautions were due to the threat of Indian hostilities. Despite the Federal Orders prohibiting it, numerous bands of Osage hunters and their families encamped at places throughout Greene County as late as the winter of 1836-37. They were the most savage of the area Indians and continued to regard the Ozarks as their rightful inherited hunting grounds. Colonel Yancey with his regiment of Greene County Militia (which included most able-bodied males) met with a band of about 200 Osages but finally had to make a call to arms to convince the larger group to leave.

Isaac's land was just east of Walnut Grove and north of his father John Looney who had settled between Cave Springs and Willard. In the early days Walnut Grove was called "Possum Trot".

After settling in Greene County, Isaac and Sarah had five more children: Louise born in 1834, Elizabeth in 1836, Arthur in 1838, David R. born about 1841, and Isaac born about 1843. The winter of 1835 was very severe with people and livestock suffering terribly.

On 16 November 1839, Isaac's father, John died. Isaac was appointed administrator of the estate in December 1839 and the goods were sold at auction in January 1840. Many of John's descendants purchased the goods and the slaves. Slavery was very predominant among the early residents of Greene County. The 1840 census found that roughly one-third of the inhabitants were slaves. Most of the area pioneers came from the south and brought with them the tradition of slavery. It is not known if Isaac brought slaves with him but he purchased four from his father's estate. John owned ten slaves at the time of his death, and these were kept within the Looney family. Most of them were later buried in the same family plot on the old John Looney farm where John was interred. The John Looney gravesite with slave burials is a registered Greene County Historic Site.

Before Isaac could complete the administration of his father's estate, he also died. He was buried on the north side of the hill where his cabin stood. According to the family Bible, he died 25 December 1842. His wife, Sally Matthews Looney was given the double task of completing the administration of her father-in-law's estate and then the administration of her husband's estate.

After Sally Looney's second marriage to John Saunders on 25 October 1849, the court appointed B. A. Jones as "Administrator de bonis non with the will annexed" and he filed bond on 4 December 1949. The preliminary accounting showed a personal estate of \$3,191 with the widow and ten children due to receive \$264.90 with \$100 reserved for the education of James Clifton Looney.

The 1860 census showed John Saunders did not live long. Sarah (Sally) was listed as head of the household in that census with sons Arthur and Isaac. John Saunders is also buried in the same graveyard as Isaac. Sarah was buried just north of Isaac with no stone to mark her grave.

William Marion Looney

The history of William Marion Looney and his descendants was written by Mrs. Ralph (Evelyn Shane) Looney.

William Marion Looney was the fourth son of Isaac and Sarah (Sally) Matthews Looney. As stated in his obituary, he was born on a farm near Paris, Monroe County, Missouri, on 31 October 1829. According to Avaline Looney Hawk, (daughter) he came to Greene County with his family when only three years old. He lived most of his life on the land his father, Isaac, settled, living first in the cabin Isaac built, then the house he built at the bottom of the hill from the cabin. This would have been closer to the well, this way he didn't have to haul water so far.

William married his second cousin, Dorcas Looney, on 4 May 1848, in Greene County, Missouri. Dorcas was the daughter of Allen and Elizabeth Bledsoe Looney. Her grandparents were Isam Looney and Annie, Princess Lightfoot, a Chickasaw Indian. Isam was a brother to John Looney, Sr. who married Mary (Polly) Garrison and William Marion's grandfather. Ten children were born to this union. The first, John Wesley, born 1850, and the last, William Allen, born in 1872.

An astute businessman was William Marion Looney. He stayed on the Isaac Looney home place, and when his brothers and sisters wanted their share of their father's estate, he bought them out. He kept investing money in land in both Polk and Greene Counties, and even bought some lots in the town of Walnut Grove itself.

In December of 1855, he paid \$4.60 for the construction of the Southwest Branch of the Pacific Rail Road, it being a portion of the \$100,000 the Greene County Court had subscribed to. This receipt shows he paid a Military Tax in Polk County in 1863 of \$1.27.

On the 9th of January 1860, William called together the qualified voters of School District #1, Township 31 of Range 2 in Polk and Greene Counties, Missouri, to a meeting on the 20th 12:00 o'clock at the Methodist Church for the purpose of voting for what kind of schoolhouse to have and the kind of tax to build it. (No information on the school's name.)

In 1871, William Marion, along with several others in the Christian Church, decided to erect a Church Building in Walnut Grove as they did not have a church there. He furnished the first logs to build the church. In 1880, the church building was leased for five years for a school, as Walnut Grove did not have a school building. In 1885, when the school was built, the church was remodeled.

In August of 1862, the day after the Battle of Wilson's Creek, William Marion rode a horse up to the battlefield. Avaline Looney Hawk says he never in his whole life forgot the carnage and bodies he saw that day.

He married second, Sally Ann Fuller, 2 June 1892. His first wife, Dorcas, having passed away 7 December 1891. William and Sally had four children, but only one survived, Avaline Looney Hawk.

William Marion died the 4th of February 1913 and is buried on his land in the Looney Cemetery. It is now the Hawk farm (1986).


