The old man answered "Everyone gets the same number of bites. Success is in the preparation and response".

Angie mentioned Rule # 10 which is "Change Begins at the Top". She also gave a win/win, lose/lose scenario. She showed a needs assessment tool.

What are your needs? What is realistic? What is important to the county as a whole? What do you have to give (negotiation)? What is the course of action?
