


Discussion:

Showers and storms are possible across the area today with some strong to severe this afternoon and evening, especially along and N of I-44. Large hail, damaging winds, and cloud to ground lighting are possible. Heavy rainfall could lead to localized flash flooding. Periodic storms are expected across the area this week with chances for some strong to severe. A renewed risk for flooding may materialize over parts of the area. The best chances for heavier rain and flooding appear to be Wed. night through Fri.

Citizen Action Statement:

- Have a severe weather shelter plan! Review emergency kit and identify closest safe shelter.
- Have a way of receiving severe weather warnings (NOAA Weather Radio, social media, news media, etc.)
- Take shelter when lightning is in the area! "When thunder roars...go indoors!"
- Citizens with outdoor recreational plans along area rivers and streams should be alert for the potential for lightning strikes and rapidly rising water levels. "Turn around...don't drown!"
