A significant round of showers and thunderstorms is expected Sunday. Severe storms and minor flooding are possible with this round. Currently the primary

severe risks are damaging winds and large hail. The best chances for severe weather will be in the late morning and afternoon hours. Localized flooding will be possible Sunday morning into the evening.

Citizen Action Statement


- Have a severe weather shelter plan. Review your emergency kit and identify the closest safe shelter.
- Have a way of receiving severe weather warnings (NOAA Weather Radio, social media, news media, etc.)
- Take shelter when lightning is in the area.
 - "When thunder roars...go indoors!"
- Citizens with outdoor recreational plans along rivers and streams should be alert for the potential for lightning strikes and rapidly rising water levels.
 - "Turn around...don't drown!"
